Dialogue

Swedish

José: Tralalalala trala lala Tra—Eh!? En Spansk-Svensk* ordbok?

José: How nice that you should work here--- Eh!? 512 Swedish kronor!? How much is that

one, then?

Johanna: 349 Swedish kronor.

José: And that one?

Johanna: 1200 kronor. It includes a CD.

José: A little expensive, perhaps... Do you have one that is cheaper?

Johanna: You can have this French-Italian pocket dictionary for a twenty kronor note.

José: Ah?? Yes, well, that wasn't quite what I was looking for...

Notes: * Spanish and Swedish (the languages) are 'spanska' and 'svenska' respectively in Swedish. When we talk about a dictionary,

however, we say 'en svensk ordbok', omitting the final 'a'. So we basically take the language, for example 'spanska' (spanish),

remove the final 'a' and add 'ordbok' (dictionary). The result: 'spank ordbok'.

Withdrawing money at a store

When paying with a bank card like VISA or Mastercard at a store in Sweden, the cashier will often ask 'vill du ha det på beloppet?'. This roughly translates to 'do you want to pay the exact amount?'. The reason the cashier asks, is because you can actually withdraw money in most stores in Sweden.

Example:

Let us say that you buy a book, the price of which is 90 SEK. The cashier asks if you want to pay the exact amount, but you say you want to pay 100 SEK. The cashier will then draw 100 SEK from you bank account, keep 90 SEK as payment for the book, and hand you the remaining 10 SEK.

This is a good way to withdraw money in Sweden, but keep in mind that there is usually a fairly low set limit to how much money you can withdraw. Most stores will also refuse withdrawal of money unless the price of the things you buy exceed a certain amount, for example 45 SEK.

The Swedish currency and money

The Swedish currency 'Svenska Kronor', abbreviated 'SEK', is typically written on price tags either as 'SEK' or ':-'. A price tag with the print '100:-' carries the same meaning as a price tag with the text '100 SEK'. In Sweden, ':-' is more common than 'SEK', although in formal documents and communication, 'SEK' is recommended.

Swedish money is available as coins and notes in the following denominations:

Note that the 0.5 SEK coin was discontinued in 2010.

The 20 SEK note The Swedish 20 SEK note is adorned on one side by the portrait of famous Swedish author Selma Lagerlöf (1858-1940), whose work include the well-known 'Nils Holgerssons underbara resa genom Sverige' (The Wonderful Adventures of Nils [Holgerssson]). The other side of the 20 SEK note, actually depicts a scene from that book, when Nils Holgersson is flying over Sweden on a goose.
